

DPA SERIES: THE NAZI HOLOCAUST — When the British liberated Belsen (near Hanover, Germany) they found 55,000 human beings still alive. The dead littered the camp and were so numerous they had to be buried in mass graves. The living had been forced to work 12 hours a day on rations of 300 to 500 calories a day (a minimum of 2,500 calories is required to keep an adult in health). They had been without water for more than six days and lived in incredibly overcrowded conditions and filth. Huts capable of housing 30 people were holding as many as 500. The above picture shows a bulldozer pushing bodies into a communal grave at the Belsen concentration camp. April 14, 1945.

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
