

4 DPA SERIES: THE NAZI HOLOCAUST - SERIES II — In the early 1930s, Storm Troopers marched through German streets singing: "Wenn das Judenblut vom Messer spritzt, dann geht's nochmal so gut." ("When Jew blood spurts from under the knife, things will be twice as good as before.") The anti-Jewish policy of the Third Reich gained momentum. On April 7, 1933, all non-Aryans were removed from public office. In Mein Kampf, Hitler asserted that tall, thin, blond, blue-eyed, large-boned Aryans were the founders of culture and the rest of mankind were the destroyers . . . particularly the Jews. (German humorists facetiously described the perfect Aryan "as blond as Hitler, as slim as Goering, and as manly as Goebbels.") The above photo aid shows some 16,000 people at a rally in the Berlin Palace of Sport (August 15, 1935) listening to the principal Nazi Jew baiter, Julius Streicher, warn that despite beatings, boycotts and expulsions, the Jewish question was far from settled. The slogans at the back of the hall read, "The Jews are our misfortune!" and, "Women and girls, the Jews are your undoing."
