

DPA SERIES: THE NAZI HOLOCAUST - 6ERIES II — In 1944, more than 1,000,000 prisoners were still incarcerated in Nazi concentration camps. Guard duty was carried out mostly by 45,000 men and women of the SS Death Head Units. Women prisoners were under the supervision of wardresses (SS-Aufseherin) who excelled in unspeakable cruelty. An exprisoner described the wardresses: "Happy are those who never had to observe the expressions on human faces. The sweet, subtle face of a woman — full of an intense desire to enjoy tormenting the defenseless, the condemned. The face of a staid matron — distorted by a violent urge to inflict still greater pain. A calm, noble face — changing into a face as if carved in stone, cruelly cold, when the people tormented and baited to death, were begging for mercy." The above photo aid shows SS-Aufseherins captured by the British at the Belsen concentration camp. These women were the equivalent to the men for brutality. April 18, 1945.
