

DPA SERIES: THE NAZI HOLOCAUST FAILED IN DENMARK — The Danish Government negotiated with the invaders, thereby hoping to protect its people from German exploitation and judicial and cultural interference. But important decisions were more often a result of German choice than of negotiation. The Government's refusal to abide by German decisions could mean its downfall. The underground press continuously attacked the Government, insisting that negotiation was collaboration. It urged the establishment of a Danish Resistance instead. Information in the illegal press encouraged public support for the Resistance. By maintaining communications with the free world, the underground journalists not only influenced public opinion; eventually they dominated it. The above Photo Aid shows how the first clandestine newspaper, "De Frie Danske" (The Free Danes), was printed.
