Roosevelt War on Costs Gets Under Way Today

Order for Merging of Farm Credit Agencies to Be Sent Congress; \$2,000,000 Saving Expected

WASHINGTON, March 26. (Exclusive)—The first of the Roosevelt economy measures to be put into effect, a consolidation of activities which is expected to save the government \$2,000,000 a year, was announced at the White House today.

The President made it known that tomorrow he will send to Congress an executive order consolidating under one hat all the farm credit agencies of the government.

He did not reveal what designation he has chosen for the organization he will create to handle the activities of the seven separate bureaus which are to be joined, but it is well known that it will be headed by Henry Morgenthau, Jr., the figure who has been placed at the head of the Farm Board.

HEAVY TASK HANDLED Mr. Morgenthau, who was the Roosevelt commissioner of conservation in the New York State government, came to Washington today to handle the consolidation of these seven bureaus which have performed the somewhat Herculean task of putting together seven agencies which have lent many millions of dollars to farmers and farm banks and organizations.

The saving of \$2,000,000 annually is expected to be accomplished through the elimination of employees in the various bureaus. At the present time some 5000 employees are employed by the administration handle the Federal farm credit activities, and it is estimated that under the reorganization the number will be cut to 4000.

The President has assigned Secretary of Commerce Daniel G. Roper the even heavier task of combining bureaus of his department and eliminating many of them.

CRASH TOLL THIRTEEN

Fire From Plane Takes New Life Federal and County Inquiry Into Tragedy Launched; Rainstorm Blamed

OAKLAND, March 26. (AP)—The thirteenth victim of last night's air crash in which a Varney Speed Lines transport plane crashed into a residence and killed twelve Federal and county authorities and officials of the air line sought the cause of the tragedy.

JAPAN FORMALLY RESIGNS FROM LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Privy Council Will Wire Document to Geneva Citing Cause of Action; Tokio to Hold Islands

TOKIO, March 27. (AP) (Monday)—The Privy Council unanimously approved today a communication to the League of Nations announcing Japan's formal resignation from the League. The document will be telegraphed to Geneva this afternoon.

The League will be informed that the Japanese government has come to the conclusion that it is no longer co-operative with the League and has decided to withdraw from the League of Nations.

Yusuke Matsukata, Japan's chief delegate to the League, recently called on the Assembly of plenipotentiaries when the League adopted a report condemning Japan's activities in Manchuria.

WILL NOTIFY GENOVA A government spokesman said the communication will be telegraphed to Geneva this afternoon, and simultaneously Japan's ambassador will issue an edict informing his subjects of the action.

The spokesman said the government considers the viewpoint that secession from the League does not raise the question of Japan's retention of the islands.

Japan will not for this question, he continued, in any form, and if it is raised by others it will be met by "unflinching Japanese determination to hold the islands."

"We consider the Japanese sovereignty over the islands the same as to Formosa and Korea," he said, "the only difference being the obligation to report annually to the League of Nations. This obligation we shall continue to observe."

State Department Declares Hitlerites Have Acted to Halt Outrages

American Hebrew Leaders Told Situation Will Soon Be Normal

WASHINGTON, March 26. (Exclusive)—Secretary of State Clegg in a telegram made public by the State Department today declared that investigation of reports of anti-Semitic activities in a Nazi-run Germany has shown there was considerable physical mistreatment of Jews, but that the government has acted to halt outrages.

The secretary's telegram, addressed to Rabbi Stephen Wise of New York and Cyrus Adler of Philadelphia, who had called on him with a request for the American government to take action to protect the Jews in Germany, follows: "You will remember that at the time of your recent call at the department I informed you that in view of numerous press statements indicating widespread mistreatment of Jews in Germany I would request the American Embassy in Berlin in consultation with the principal consulates in Germany to investigate the situation and submit a report to the department."

"A reply has now been received indicating that whereas there was some physical mistreatment of Jews, this phase may be considered virtually terminated. The situation is being kept under close watch and instances of professional discrimination, though still present, are being met with serious concern by the German government."

"Hitler, in his capacity as leader of the Nazi party issued an order calling on his followers to maintain law and order, to avoid molestating foreigners, and to refrain from any act which would tend to avoid the creation of possibly embarrassing international incidents."

BUSINESS SLUMP BLAMED ON WEATHER BY SAVANT

CINCINNATI (O.) March 26. (AP) The weather, suspects Dr. Clarence A. Mills, may have had something to do with the business slump.

Professor of experimental medicine at the University of Cincinnati, he explained today that five years' study of climatic conditions and the effect of weather on business has led him to the conclusion that the weather has plenty to do with economic conditions.

He found, he said, that charts of temperature changeability and of business index for the past 50 years are strikingly alike. Where temperatures fluctuate widely, business drops ahead. Where temperatures fluctuate little, business drops behind.

"The reason, he said, his studies indicate is that the weather conditions which control the energy production of the human body are most active under conditions of low temperature, simply because the body needs more energy to adjust itself to the changing conditions of low temperature."

"Man and his energy depend on climatic stimulation, and that stimulates his development," he said. "All activity is a matter of man's energy. In the Gulf States, tropics and Orient, the lack of climatic stimulation causes man's energy to be low."

"In the northern regions, man must adjust himself to the conditions of high temperature. For a good part of the time he is left with an excess of energy, and this excess drives him to expend it in other things. That is responsible for the typical American restlessness. We can't remain at a given level of energy, simply because, of course, we often go too far."

"To demonstrate his theory, he kept some animals for years under varying climatic conditions. In a room at 90 deg., had little surplus energy. Others, kept in a 60-deg. room, had a surplus of energy. Through the winter, glands stimulation lessened, and consequently the driving force slumped and man relaxed. He does that every winter, and expansion and contraction of energy is a matter of man's energy.
