

# F.D.R. Secret Letters

## Stalin and Roosevelt plotted with Jew Zionists to divide the World

**UNBELIEVABLE BUT TRUE:** American newspapers have been afraid to print secret letters recently unearthed in Europe between Franklin D. Roosevelt and Zionist agents of Joe Stalin. Some months ago reference to these letters was made in a certain French newspaper, but they were so terrific that, for fear of the Jews, the American press ignored them. Early in March (1951) these letters came to light in the U. S. A. They reveal the following:

1. In 1943 F. D. R. secretly instructed a private emissary (a Jew by the name of Zabrowsky and leader of the World Zionist movement) to approach Joe Stalin with certain extraordinary proposals.
2. A plan to share the permanent government of the world with Russia.
3. Discard and destroy the so-called Atlantic Charter and let Russia have the little countries for exploitation.
4. Admit Russia to the Mediterranean.
5. Turn practically all of Europe over to Stalin's domain.
6. Let Russia have its way in the Orient.
7. F. D. R. would rule the Western Hemisphere.

### **SENSATIONAL AND SUPER-SENSATIONAL**

The most sensational and super-sensational thing about these secret proposals, which were intercepted by certain investigating agencies in the European underground, lies in the fact that the deal was being tied up through the instrumentality of the Jew-Zionist machine rather than through the regular channels of the State Department and the United States Senate.

**Later, however,** the State Department bent its policies to satisfy the whims of Roosevelt, Stalin and the Zionists.

Here is the super-secret letter written by Franklin Roosevelt on February 20, 1943, and delivered to Zabrowsky (the Jew Zionist leader), setting forth a plan for dividing world authority between Stalin and Roosevelt. This explains many of the serious problems that Christian civilization is facing today.

February 20, 1943

My Dear Mr. Zabrowsky:

As I have already said personally to you and to Mr. Weiss, I am profoundly moved by the fact that the National Council of Young Israel has had the extreme kindness to offer itself in the role of intermediary between me and our mutual friend Stalin, and that at a moment so delicate that any danger of friction in the framework of the United Nations—created at a cost of so many sacrifices—would have fatal consequences for all, and more particularly for the Soviet Union.

It is, therefore, to your interest and to ours to smooth out the rough corners, which will be difficult with Litvinov, to whom, to my great regret, I have had to give warning that whoever tangles with Uncle Sam winds up by suffering for it, a warning which applies equally to foreign affairs as well as internal affairs.

The Soviet pretensions, insofar as they concern Communist activities in the states of the American Union are, in effect, doubly intolerable.

Timochenko has shown himself much more reasonable during his short but fruitful stay here, and I hope that a new interview with the marshall will be a rapid step toward that exchange of viewpoints with Stalin which I consider among the most urgent, especially when I think of all the good that has resulted from the Stalin-Churchill meeting.

The United States and Great Britain are disposed—without any moral reservation—to give absolute equality of vote to the U.S.S.R. in the future organization of the postwar world.

It (Russia) will be a member—as the British prime minister made it known to him (Stalin) from Adana in sending him his preliminary plans—of the directing group in the framework of the council of Europe and of the council of Asia, to which it is entitled, not only by reason of the extensive intercontinental situation of the U.S.S.R., but also and especially because of its magnificent struggle against Naziism which will merit the plaudits of historians.

We hope to see these continental councils (and I speak in the name of my great country and of the important British empire) composed of all the independent respective states with, however, a proportionate equitable representation.

And you can assure Stalin, my dear Mr. Zabrowsky, that the U.S.S.R. will function in the directorate of these councils (Europe and Asia) on the same footing of equality and with an equal voice as the United States and England, and that it will be a member of the high court that will have to be created to solve the differences existing among the various nations; that she (Russia) will participate likewise in the selection and preparation of international forces in the arming and command of these forces, which, under orders of the continental council, will act within each state to the end that the rules so elaborately worked out for the maintenance of peace in the spirit of the former League of Nations will not again be violated.

These entities between states and their armies will be able to impose their decisions and enforce obedience.

Under these conditions, this situation, so elevated in the direction of the tetrarchy of the universe, must satisfy Stalin and cause him not to renew demands which create insoluble problems. The secretariat, however, is destined for France, with consultative but not deliberative voice, as a recompense for her resistance and punishment for her previous vacillation.

Thus, the American continent will remain outside all Soviet propaganda and under the exclusive influence of the United States, as we have promised to our continental countries; France will have to remain within the English orbit, with, however, a large autonomy and the right to the secretariat of the tetrarchy.

Under the protection of England, Portugal, Spain, Italy and Greece will evolve toward a modern civilization which will remove them from their traditional lethargy.

In addition, there will be given to Russia a port on the Mediterranean.

We accede to its desires with respect to Finland and the Baltic in general; we will demand from Poland a reasonable attitude of comprehension and compromise.

There remains for Stalin a vast field of expansion in the little countries of Eastern Europe.

Naturally, one must take into account the rights of those two loyal nations, Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia, without omitting the total recuperation of the territories which have been temporarily snatched from great Russia.

After having dismembered the Reich and after having reattached various zones to other countries, thus creating new nationalities, the German danger will be removed from the U.S.S.R., from Europe, and from the entire world.

As for Turkey, Stalin must understand the necessary assurances which Churchill has given to President Inonu, in his name and in my own.

The port of the Mediterranean which is to be given to Stalin must suffice him.

As for Asia, we are in accord with his demands, barring subsequent complications.

As for Africa, what can we do?

It will be necessary to give something to France to compensate for her losses in Asia, and also something to Egypt, as has been promised to the Wafdists; it will be necessary, too, to give to Spain and to Portugal some compensation for their sacrifices and to bring about a better world equilibrium.

The United States, likewise, by right of conquest, will inevitably claim some vital point as its zone. And that will be justice.

Finally, we will have to accord to Brazil the little colonial expansion which she has been promised.

Kindly transmit to Stalin, my dear Mr. Zabrowsky, that, for the general good and for the rapid annihilation of the Reich—all these things are only general ideas submitted for study—he will have to yield in the matter of the colonization of Africa.

Transmit to him likewise the assurance of my complete comprehension, of my fellow-feeling, and of my desire to speed the solution of these problems.

To that end, the interview which I propose would present a practical interest.

I have read with the greatest pleasure, as I have already said, the generous terms of the message which has informed me of your decision to offer me, in the name of the national council, a copy of that which is the greatest treasure of Israel: a scroll of the Torah. This letter evidences my acceptance. To your loyalty, I respond with the greatest confidence.

Please I beg you, transmit to the high organization over which you preside the expression of my gratitude in connection with the banquet given on the occasion of its 31st anniversary.

I wish you the greatest success.
