Hello, honey. It has been a few days again since I have written to you, but my days have been pretty well occupied. We don't get too much spare time and I went to the show the night before last. I saw Kay Kyser in "Swing Fever" — pretty good but not too wonderful.

But the biggest news of the day is that I visited New York City yesterday and last night. We have been allowed a few passes a day for the last three days. I certainly couldn't pass up a chance to go to New York. That is why I wired for the money. I got the \$20⁰⁰ and have spent nearly all of it already. I had a wonderful time, though.

Three of us went into the big city together. One of the fellows knew a little (next sheet)

bit about New York and had been there a number of times, so he took the two of us from Calif. to see the sights.

First of all we ate in the Marine Grill and then we went to a souvenir store and got some souvenirs of New York to send to our respective homes. You should get another pillow case about the time that you get this letter if not before, so you can add it to your collection. I also sent Mother a Mother pillow case and sent Mother C. a pretty lace hanky with New York on them.

Next we went to the RCA building or "Radio City." We paid admission and rode an elevator to the 65th floor and then changed elevators just as one would change trains. (next sheet)

We rode the second elevator to the 70th floor and then walked on up onto the deck on the roof top. Believe me, it is really something to be 70 stories high, and we really had a nice vantage point for looking out over town. However, as luck would have it there was a slight haze in the air and we could not see the Hudson River, East River, Statue of Liberty, nor any of the outlying sections of New York.

During my visit to New York I saw Radio City, Empire State Bldg at a distance, Jack Dempsey's Bar, the entrance to Madison Square Gardens, Broadway, 5th Ave, Central Park at a distance, Times Square, 10 or 15 famous hotels, restaurants, etc. and so many places that we have heard about that I couldn't begin to list them all.

unhappy about going overseas with this unit.
I like the unit and the men in it so well
that I am more than willing to go anywhere
with them. Especially so when I think
that actually I will be coming closer (next)

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to the day when I can come back to you
and Laura again.

Well, darling, I seem to have written
quite a book. I believe that I had
better sign off for tonight and get a
little sleep. I don't think that I will
even be awake to see the New Year
come in. I lost quite a bit of sleep
last night and today was a busy
day, too. Also, we have to get up at
about 5:45 am tomorrow the same as
any other day. So, I wish you a
Happy New Year, sweetheart, and bid
